


NOWHERE IS THAT TRUER THAN AROUND THE RED BRICK COMPLEX OF THE SPINNEREI, A REVAMPED COTTON MILL IN THE (FORMER) INDUSTRIAL AREA OF PLAGWITZ. IN RECENT YEARS IT HAS MORPHED INTO A HUB OF CREATIVITY, WITH INDUSTRIAL SPACES BEING CONVERTED INTO SHOWROOMS, DESIGN, MUSIC AND DANCE STUDIOS, ARTISTS' STUDIOS AND ART GALLERIES. IT'S LIKE AN ART CITADEL COMPLETE WITH AN ART STORE, A CAFÉ, AND A CAFETERIA/LOUNGE/BAR DESIGNED BY BRAZILIAN ARCHITECT OSCAR NIEMEYER THAT WILL OPEN ITS DOORS IN THE KIROW FACTORY.



Local (and international) works are also on display in neighboring spaces such as ASPN Galerie, which exhibits art by interesting newcomers like Benedikt Leonhardt or Galerie Jochen Hempel introducing names such as Katja Tönnissen. Halle 14, an inspiring cultural center, offers workshops, educational programs, and drawing classes taught by local painters. Around the Spinnerei, the Plagwitz area, brimming with cool venues, is worth exploring. Discover the Kunstkraftwerk, a former power plant whose spaces host multi-media exhibitions and multisensorial installations. And admire post-industrial structures such as the Westwerk: it will house a food market, artist studios and a café. It already features ateliers such as WKR, where the restored industrial furniture is enthralling, or Enzo Forciniti, where an Italian artist creates hand-made wood glass frames. Ob-





The Galerie für Zeitgenössische Kunst is like a contemporary art campus in a park: there is a central building, a café serving home-made food, Tschau Tschüssi, a boutique jam-packed with objects by international artists, and two residential suites, Paris Syndrom and Volksboutique, designed by artists Jun Yang and Christine Hill, that can be rented to spend a night surrounded by creativity. Inspiration galore is to be found also at the Grassi Museum, whose collections include musical instruments, furniture, textiles and porcelain. The current exhibition »Together!«,



found in the picturesque old town, where Gothic, Renaissance and late 17th century styles adorn palaces, church-

es and courtyards. Located in the heart of the shopping area, the Museum der Bildenden Künste displays art

from the late Middle Ages to Modernity. A room is dedicated to Neo Rauch, while works by contemporary artists, such as a gigantic dinosaur by Edith Karlson, embellish


